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
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
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
We welcome Families/Carers to our toddler group, based in Netherton at the Methodist Church.

'Season of Mists' Again

It's mid-autumn now and there's a hazy mist descending on the landscape round me. The evening is warm and pleasant, for a change, and I can enjoy our quixotic, British weather, with its Indian summer warmth.

On the old wooden bench where I like to sit, someone has left a chipped little plate lying on the ground nearby. I stoop down to retrieve it. I can just decipher the words 'A ROUND TUIT', inscribed across the middle. It made me smile. It was a standing joke with an old friend over a pint of beer many years ago that we'd do a particular job, whatever it was, when we could get 'round to it'. (Never do today what you can put off till tomorrow?) Jobs got done, but in their own time. Amidst all the gardening jobs that have to be done, there's got to be a time for sitting back for a moment and relaxing. Or, as the famous professional golfer, Ben Hogan, once said: 'As you walk down the fairway of life, you must smell the roses, for you only get one round.'

At this time of the year there's still plenty of work to be done in the garden, of course. But mulching is my top priority at the moment. particularly as I'm on a 'no-dig' campaign again this year.

Mulching helps so much to recondition the soil, retain moisture as well as keep weeds under control. Composted garden and kitchen waste, bark mulch, shredded leaves – all biodegradable – are important to cover bare soil. Many gardeners will say that mulching is best done in spring before weeds take off, but there's nothing wrong in adding a late autumn covering. Soil conditioners (bought from The Trading Hut) can also be introduced to the mix to give the soil the help it needs. (The RHS website has a good, informative article on mulching (rhs.org.uk) - well worth a look. So, too, 'The Mulch Book; a Complete Guide for Gardeners'. Ok for a winter night, with nothing on television!)

As the light fades, my next-door neighbour has lit a bonfire. Wisps of light grey smoke saunter through the beech hedge across to where I'm sitting in my garden. It doesn't worry me. I love the smell of burning wood, and don't find this intrusion at all offensive, though some might. All of a sudden, this gentle, acrid smell takes my mind back to my childhood.

I'm back in the 1940s. The war has been over for a few years now, but people are still relieved, joyous, happy. People laugh a lot, stand by their garden walls and talk over the fence or wall about the future, and the

hope for a new and peaceful beginning. (Norman Evans made much comic use of this over-the-garden-wall scenario! Some of you may remember he used to play the part of Fanny Fairbottom, a toothless, hatchet-faced, Lancastrian housewife, gossiping with neighbours over a garden wall, complaining about their ailments, and mouthing the words too 'rude' to speak out loud. (I think Les Dawson, a couple of generations later, might have had Norman Evans' act in mind for some of his material.) Evans was a much-loved character in pantos in Leeds and the north.

I also vividly recall the bonfires we had on November 5th in those days. Almost every street had its own bonfire. Damage to the tarmac? There was no tarmac – all the suburban streets were still cobbled where we lived – and there was little traffic. During our half-term autumn holidays, as kids let loose, we spent our days 'chumping'- collecting wood wherever we could - gangs of young urchins dragging branches of trees, boxes or fences (!) to our bonfire.

Then came 'Mischief Night', November 4th. None of your American-import Halloe'en dressing up 'trick or treat' stuff. This was serious mischief – knocking on neighbours' doors and running away, putting jam on neighbours' door handles, fastening their dustbin lids together, then tying them to their front door handles, taking wooden gates off their hinges on front drives. And various other vandal activities too feebly embarrassing to recall!

In those old, dark, yellow-smoggy days, at best we were a nuisance to our neighbours; at worst we were borderline criminal! 'Juvenile delinquents?' Not really; we rarely overstepped the mark – we were too afraid of our local bobby on the beat. He knew all of us, and where we lived, and he knew my mam and dad, and we didn't do anything that would bring his heavy feet down on us! Or shame on them. Healthy fear, I reckon, is a good influence for encouraging self-discipline!

And then came Bonfire Night itself, with the family and almost all the local street community taking part. The fire was lit with due ceremony, and we all recited:

'Remember, remember, the 5th of November, gunpowder, treason, and plot. There seems no reason why gunpowder treason should ever be forgot.'

We knew of Guy Fawkes, of course - but not much what he stood for - or cared. In those meagre days, we were lucky to have fireworks. I remember my dad most years brought home a little box of Standard fireworks, made in Huddersfield. There'd be a couple of rockets, a Roman candle, a Golden

Showers fountain, one or two Catherine wheels, some jumping crackers, a couple of packets of sparklers and half a dozen 'Little Imp' or 'Thunderflash' bangers! Somewhere the instructions warned us to hold the fireworks at arm's length (apart from the rockets and bangers!). As if! (The jumping crackers we threw near where people were standing! No comment!)

To end the evening, do you remember, we all stood round the dying fire and talked about this and that, mainly football. (We discussed this young lad, John Charles, brought in from Swansea to play for Leeds. He could be a good prospect.) Casting off our windcheaters, but still warm in our garish Fair Isle jumpers, with faces red from the heat, and coalblack hands, we tossed potatoes into the glowing embers; we watched and waited till the spuds burnt black, raked them out, skinned and ate them piping hot. Along with slices of parkin (not unlike ginger cake, but made of oatmeal and treacle), we were well and truly satisfied. We grubby kids couldn't ask for more.....wonderful Bonfire Night.

Well, believe me, that's how it used to be. Happy, care-less, memorable days.

Back now, back in the present, sitting on a bench in my garden, my own garden, lucky me, in the quiet of a balmy autumn evening, relaxing, reflecting, with a chipped little plate in my hands, with 'A ROUND TUIT' painted on it, smoke gets in my eyes.

Cocktail Corner

Mulled pear and cranberry punch **Ingredients** (for 8-10 glasses)

ıL pear cider

1L pear (or cloudy apple) juice

1L cranberry juice

good handful fresh or dried cranberries

150ml sloe gin

2 cinnamon sticks

2 <u>vanilla pods</u>, scored lengthways (or essence)

Method

Put all ingredients into your biggest saucepan, when you are ready to serve heat to just below simmering point, then ladle into glasses.

Netherton Heritage Trail (Part Two)

A self guided walk through Netherton's past. For Part One see spring 2024 edition. Created by Members of the Coxley Live Local History Group (a few years ago!)

- 6. **Hartley Bank Colliery** Walk down to the cricket club (now Hartley Bank Community Field) and look across the fields to the canal. The fields were landscaped after open cast mining. Hartley Bank Colliery was sunk in 1881 and closed in 1968. The shafts were on the left hand side of Balk Lane and other colliery buildings stood on the right where a small plantation of trees now grows.
- 7. **Netherton Drift Mine.** Retrace your steps up Balk Lane and turn left along Blacker Lane. At the top of the hill, behind a dormer bungalow on your right is a pit heap. The Drift Mine opened in 1889 and abandoned in 1897.
- 8. The only blue house in Netherton is no longer blue and started
 - life as a Primitive Methodist chapel: it was built around 1840 and was converted to a residential property in the 1950s. Internally the original wooden floor and wooden beams survive. The neighbouring stone buildings to the right of the chapel on Blacker Lane were also



- owned by the Primitive Methodists. Unusually, the ground floor window of this building is set very low to the pavement, but inside the floor level is much lower.
- 9. Netherton Stores has a cellar to the left of the shop. The premises have been used for several businesses and originally opened in 1894 as a branch of the Cooperative Society and closed in 1975. During the war, schoolchildren had to practice sheltering in the cellar. Apparently there were rows of benches in there for the children to sit on with their gas masks on of course. They were here as there was insufficient space in Netherton school cellars.

Pub Review

Hickory's Smokehouse near the M1 overpass just beyond Horbury used to be a pub called the Old Mill, built, I suppose on the site of a former mill when the area was redeveloped. The Old Mill was a chain pub, but used to provide a decent pint. Hickory's Smokehouse is also a chain, with rather more focus on being a restaurant than a pub, but when I went in for a drink one lunchtime last week there was no problem just getting a drink in the bar area.

The Smokehouse chain has restaurants across the north and northwest of England – there's also one in Huddersfield and one in Leeds. Like most of these kind of places, it's not a mecca for real ale drinkers, but then again it doesn't set out to be. I had a pint of their own 'Hickory's Smokehouse Pale Ale' which is brewed by the Purity Brewing Company, who



do a lot of craft keg beers, and it was very refreshing and drinkable, in the Purity house style. They also offered Sierra Nevada Pale Ale and a range of lagers which I imagine would go well with the food.

I didn't eat there, but the food menu does look very good. I've been to restaurants in the southern states of the U.S., which this is obviously inspired by, and the food does have that feel to it, though of course geared up for the local market here. Breakfasts are on the menu, but more your full English fry than the grits and gravy you'd get in Louisiana. Probably that's better anyway!



On the dinner menu, plenty of pulled pork, smoked chicken, ribs, brisket, corn and mac 'n' cheese, as it's called nowadays, which all looks very appetising; though it would have been nice to see jambalaya or blackened catfish on there, the demand might not have justified it.

Wakefield isn't New Orleans just yet, but you might get a flavour of it in this pub.

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Back to the 1940s

On a Friday in mid-July we headed to the former spa town of Woodhall Spa in Lincolnshire for the 1940s weekend. The town will forever be associated with the RAF 617 Squadron, otherwise known as "the Dambusters". On arrival, its tradition to head to the local fish & chip shop called Archers next door to the Trading Post. Then we drove to the Tea House in the Woods for afternoon cream tea. It's a special place that we've visited many times. Suitably stuffed we ambled over to what is the oldest cinema in the country, the Kinema in the Woods, which dates back to 1922. It's an amazing place to look around. Full of nostalgia and reminders of days gone by. Then it was off for a pint in the 617 Bar in the Woodhall Inn before wandering over the road to visit the Cottage Museum. The building itself is rare and historic and made from pre-formed sheets of corrugated iron. It's a unique insight into the life and times of the town and its occupants as it developed.

The 1940s weekend is now centred around the Woodhall Caravan Park and on our way there to book into our Lodge we looked for and found the Wellington Monument in a quiet field by Waterloo Woods. Then it was time for more food! We drove past Jubilee Park, a beautifully preserved throwback to Victorian Britain with well cared for rose gardens, a bandstand and an outdoor lido, and headed to the Ebrington Arms in a little hamlet called Kirkby on Bain. Joy of joys they were serving Abbeydale Brewery's 'Deception' at the bar. We each had a starter of a warm garlic bulb with rustic bread. You don't often see that on a menu.

A couple of hours later we made our way back to our lodge via the Petwood Hotel, a former WW1 hospital. This magnificent building is associated with the 617 Squadron and the officers who billeted there including Group Captains Guy Gibson and Leonard Cheshire. Who knows what conversations took place inside the inner rooms of this old hotel before their greatest achievement. "Operation Chastise" was carried out by the Lancaster Bomber Dambusters on the night of the 17th May 1943 using the ingenious 'bouncing bombs' designed by the brilliant inventor Barnes Wallis.

The next day we headed for one of our favourite museums just south of Boston. On the way we passed RAF Tattershall and RAF Coningsby home of the Battle of Britain Memorial Flight. The planes are currently grounded pending an investigation following the terrible Spitfire crash in May. Just as

we approached an area called New York we happened upon the Bubblecar Museum and decided to take a look. It's a fascinating place with a huge number of these 3 wheelers (2 at the front and 1 at the back) and it brought a smile to our faces because they are quite funny to look at. Their heyday was in the 1950s and early 60s and Gina Ward was seen driving one made by Messerschmidt in Heartbeat!

Arriving at the WW2 Museum "We'll Meet Again" it remains just as brilliant as ever with an ever-growing private collection of Home Front memorabilia in 2 main buildings. There's a third building in the making to

house the recently acquired life size scale model of a Hurricane which featured in the 1969 film the "Battle of Britain". At the time, it was put on top of the Lincoln Odeon roof for 2 months to help advertise the film. Over 50 years later the Hurricane was eventually successfully traced to a barn in Somerset and Paul, the owner of the museum, managed to buy it to bring it 'home'. It's now been completely re-fabricated and repainted it in its original 1942 camouflage colours and it's believed to be one of only 5 left in the world.



There's a reason the museum is situated where it is... because it's a stone's throw from the Freiston Shore

WW2 coastline defence bunkers. These concrete buildings tell the tale of the possible imminent German seaborne invasion and include the gun emplacements, searchlight housing and munitions store. The museum has just been awarded a "Top 10 Best Museum" by Trip Advisor. A well-earned tribute to Paul and all the hard working and welcoming staff.

On our way back to Woodhall we called in to the famous Blue Bell pub which the aircrews used to visit and where coins were placed in the beams by the servicemen so they could buy themselves a pint on their return from air raids. Sadly, many stayed lodged there and can still be seen today. Later, we caught up with a few friends in the 1940s vehicle display field and listened to some period songs blasting out on the PA!

Sunday dawned and we slipped quietly away up the A1 and back to 2024. I wonder what many of that greatest generation would think of our world today.

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

HOSPICE CARE - MYTHS BUSTED!

At a recent PPG meeting we heard from the team at Wakefield Hospice about their work. Below is what they have written for our Newsletter.

Hospices care for people who are dying, however palliative care is more than the last few days of life. Wakefield Hospice supports patients and their families at varying stages of their illness, from the diagnosis of a terminal illness until the patient's death and beyond, caring for patients who are known to us and their loved ones via our bereavement services. Some people receive hospice care for just a few days, while others get support for several months. We offer patients the opportunity to live a fulfilled and enjoyable life with an emphasis on making the most of the time available to them, in an environment which is friendly and comfortable. A hospice is not a nursing home, but a specialist clinical environment which enables the patients to live with their life limiting illness with the privacy and dignity they deserve.

We are working to dispel misconceptions about Care at Wakefield Hospice. Here are a few commonly held myths that we would like to bust!

Hospices are where you go to die: Nearly half of patients admitted to the hospice return home. A patient may require hospice admission at various stages of their illness, maybe for rehabilitation after treatment or to control complex symptoms and might be with us just for a few days. Unfortunately, we are not a long-term care environment.

Hospices are a sad place to be: There are sad times, of course, but our staff and volunteers try to make the hospice a home away from home, where patients are comfortable, and their loved ones can focus on just being together. Hospice care is not about giving up.

All patients in hospices are elderly: Hospice care is available for anyone who needs it, at any age. Wakefield Hospice is an adult hospice, caring for people aged 18 to over 100. It is a common misconception that hospice care is exclusively for the elderly, when in fact 25% of those that die in Hospices across the UK are under 65.

Hospices are for people with cancer: Our patients have other life limiting conditions and our day therapy teamwork with many of those from the earliest days of their diagnosis.

Wakefield Hospice care is about seeing somebody as a living person, not a dying patient and supporting those close to them and providing palliative care which can include; Pain and symptom management, Psychological & spiritual support, Practical and financial advice and counselling and bereavement services. A very small percentage of our funding comes from the NHS, and the rest is raised by our fantastic local community, through a variety of ways including general fundraising such as donations and events, legacies, our lottery and through our Hospice shops.

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2: THE NURSING TEAM

Advanced Nurse Practitioner (ANP)

An ANP is a Registered Nurse with additional training for performing

tasks, such as diagnosing and prescribing, which are customarily performed by a Physician. A Registered Nurse is educated to Masters Level in Advanced Practice, and assessed as competent in practice using expert knowledge and skills. They have freedom to act and make their own decisions in the assessment, diagnosis and treatment of those in their care and are capable of independent practice in a variety of settings. Their role will be tailored not only by their training but their clinical experience as Senior Practitioners. In General Practice, ANPs can consult and work independently but will consult medical colleagues when they need advice. Middlestown has 4 ANPs.

Practice Nurses

Practice Nurses are fully trained in a wide range of skills including immunisations, health promotion, contraception and management of long -term conditions e.g. advice on diet and lifestyle choices, coronary heart disease, hypertension, asthma, diabetes, smoking cessation and obesity. Practice Nurses can extend their skills at Diploma Level and see many patients who previously would have seen the Doctor.

The Nursing Team run various Nurse-led clinics for diabetes, asthma, coronary heart disease and COPD as well as providing general nursing services, dressings, removal of sutures and blood tests.

Healthcare Assistants (including Phlebotomy)

Often the busiest staff in practice, with the highest number of patient contacts each day. Healthcare Assistants assist in patient care and Practice related duties. Our Healthcare Assistants are highly experienced professionals working collaboratively with the General Practice Team to meet the needs of patients, and provide essential clinical task-orientated services like taking blood samples (phlebotomy); wound care; processing specimens; giving vaccinations; offering lifestyle support, advice and guidance for example: weight management and stop smoking services; performing ECGs (to measure heart function) and spirometry (to measure lung function); not to mention leading on practice infection prevention and control. They play a crucial role in delivering key services for patient healthcare.

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
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St Andrew's Netherton
