
Netherton Walking Group



How about a visit to Ossett Flower Club?

Ossett Flower Club is a friendly and vibrant club who meet on the 2nd Monday evening of each month. We employ experienced demonstrators to come and entertain us by creating wonderful arrangements with fresh flowers and foliage. They have fascinating stories to enthral us throughout the evening. The beautiful arrangements are the raffle prizes, which many people are then fortunate enough to take home. At the end of the demonstration, you can chat over a cuppa and piece of delicious cake.

We organise social events such as 'Beetle Drives', various craft workshops and outings to flower shows. Each year we hold a tombola stall at local galas. You may have seen us at Horbury or Ossett and won one of the flower arrangements.

Experienced members of the club hold flower classes on the 3rd Monday evening of each month, at a cost of £10 a session. Anyone can come along if you book a place with Kal. (<u>karolinatunningley@gmail.com</u>)

No experience is necessary as you will be helped to create a beautiful design for your home. We send you a list of what to bring and a photo of what the arrangement could look like. No two turn out the same, but all look special!

A date for your diary is our meeting on **Monday 9**th **February** when we have a demonstration of bee keeping, and also how to make arrangements using silk flowers. It should be a 'honey filled' evening. No need to book, just come along and you will be most welcome.

Flowers brighten your room, especially as the winter days get shorter. Here are a few tips to make your flowers last longer in a vase.

• Usually, they come with flower food which feeds the flowers so they last. Add the sachet to a litre of water in a clean container. You won't need a litre in the vase, just a depth of 3" or 8cm. The rest you can use to top up the vase later. Just like us, too much food isn't good for them!

- Always cut 1" or 2cm off the bottom of each stem, then put the stem into the water in the vase. The stem gets dry once it is out of water and a seal forms, so the flower can't drink. Ensure you remove all the leaves which would be underwater.
- Cut each stem at a slope as it helps it take up water more easily.
- If you have carnations, don't cut at the bumps on the stem, cut between the bumps, or again the flower can't drink.
- If you have chrysanthemums then remove as many leaves as possible before cutting and adding the stem to the vase. The leaves die much more quickly than the flowers.
- Amaryllis flowers have hollow stems. Cut these stems straight and only leave 1" or 2cm of water in the vase, topping it up as needed. The stems can go very soft in too much water.

We would be delighted to see you at one of our club meetings, or at our flower class evenings. The club has about 30 members and there are about 16 people attend the classes. We say 'fun and friendship through flowers'.

Middlestown Primary Academy

December is always a busy time in a Primary School and that will be no different at Middlestown Primary Academy. The events that will take place in the lead up to Christmas include a whole school trip to the pantomime, a charity reindeer run, Christmas lunch and Christmas parties. We also host the annual Fayre which will take place on Thursday 4th December and we finish the term off with the Middlestown and Overton Carol Service at St Luke's Church at 6pm on Friday 18th December. It is such a special time of year and the children will be fully immersed in the build up to Christmas.

In January and February, we start to plan our day and residential trips for the children to enjoy. Year 4 visit Nell Bank in Ilkley for a night where they focus on outdoor activities including orienteering, den building and pond dipping. Year 6 then go on their residential to Robinwood where they get to experience rock climbing, archery, canoeing and the giant swing (to name a few). We think it is important for our children to experience a vast range of activities and events and these residentials fully support that.

One of our favourite events of the year will be when the school choir alongside Year 3 will travel to Sheffield Arena for the annual Young Voices concert. Not only is this an opportunity for them to sing with hundreds of other children, they also get to see live acts and performances from singers, dancers and musicians.

In February, the children will take part in the NSPCC Number Day. The children will take part in a range of activities related to numbers and maths as well as raising funds for this important charity. As a school, we raise money for local and national charities including Children in Need, mental health charities and Wakefield Hospice.

Mine's a Pint or Der mijn is een pint

This time, the pub review is coming to you from Olivier's Biercafe in the Dutch city of Utrecht, half an hour on a speedy Dutch train south of Amsterdam. Everything in the Netherlands seems clean, new and efficient. All the people are very tall and there are bikes everywhere, which you never hear coming.

This pub, or bier cafe, is an amazing converted church - we have visited three times in our weekend visit. There is an organ loft, complete with organ, at one end, and religious statues at the other. The conversion from a house of prayer to a house of beer



has been done with a light touch. It specialises in Belgian ales, and of course the monastic tradition of brewing in Belgium is an ancient one. Most of the world's few authenticated Trappist Ales - beers brewed and bottled wholly by monks in a silent order - come from Belgium. (Though we have one in England just down the M1 from us at Mount Saint Bernard in Leicestershire, well worth a visit for any beer lover).

The first time we came here I had a bottle of La Trappe - beer from the very first Trappist monastery, and this time I've chosen a gold Carolus, which is not a Trappist beer, but still has the same strong, heavy, unctuous style. These beers are ones to linger over, all strong (8% and upwards), so all in small 33cl bottles. Beers in England used to be more like this, stronger and smaller, until the First World War when changes in duty on strong ale, intended to stop workers in weapons factories getting too drunk, began our national habit of drinking pints of weaker beer. But these Trappist Ales are some of the best beers in the world, and Oliver's biercafe is one of the best and most atmospheric places I've ever found to drink them.

There's also an extensive food menu with a Belgian theme; lots of toasted sandwiches and sausages, but we just had plates of fries, with mayonnaise, naturally. Don't want to distract from the beer.



We look forward to December cos it's party time – and Christmas Lunch as well. We do like to eat and play silly games at our Christmas party. We are all still young at heart!


On the 13th January our speaker is someone from the Wakefield Recovery and Well Being College. They offer a range of courses and one-off



New GP contract

You may have seen much in the news in recent months about the introduction of the new NHS GP Contract from 1st October 2025. The Practice Manager, Tony Nicholas, writes the following –

"The GP contractual changes will have little effect or impact on the services we already provide and the patients' experience!

Your GP practice has and will continue to remain open Monday to Friday o8:00 – 18:30.

We are committed to providing the NHS services patients need, offering both same day urgent care appointments and more routine care appointments bookable in advance. Our experienced reception staff are on hand to navigate your need to the most appropriate service so will ask you the reason for your call. This may include, for example, asking you to send a photo of a skin complaint, sending a leaflet to help you self-care, put you down for a home visit or direct you to attend a pharmacy, walk-in centre, optician or dentist. In some cases, you may be signposted to A+E for urgent care. Signposting to other services is to ensure you do not experience unnecessary delays in getting the right care, diagnostic assessments and treatment by the most appropriate service. Please remember that we are here to help you. All we ask is that our patients act reasonably and are considerate of the demands they make of us.

If you feel unwell in the evening or at the weekend and it's something you would usually contact your GP about, you can contact GP Care Wakefield. Call the practice telephone number (01924 237100) and when the practice is closed, your call is automatically diverted to GP Care Wakefield when they are open. All calls are answered by a friendly care navigator who works in Wakefield, usually within a few minutes. Explain your symptoms as clearly as you can so the care navigator can book you into the relevant service.

GP Care Wakefield is open: Monday to Friday 5pm – 9.30pm; Saturdays 9am – 5pm; Sundays 9am – 1pm. Bank Holidays 9am – 3pm (including 25^{th} and 26^{th} December and 1^{st} January)

Between 10pm and 8am the next morning patients should call 111."

GP Practice survey

The results are in! This year's GP Practice Survey results can be found by searching the internet for GP Practice Survey, then for Middlestown. The results are impressive, with Middlestown being above average under the majority of the headings. Overall good experience at Middlestown is 85%, with the national average being 75% and in West Yorkshire 77%.

304 surveys were sent out to Middlestown patients who had had a recent appointment, and 40% were returned, which is 5% above the average.

Welcome, Autumn Season Of Misssed Opportunities And Mellow Idleness

SPRING 'Fail to prepare: prepare to fail.'

The words kept coming back to me time and again, like an old tune you've heard on the radio - an 'earworm', I think they call it these days. 'Fail to' Ok, I get the message. The gardening 'expert' on the gardening programme on tv was beginning to get through to me.

But, seriously, can you 'fail' with gardening? I mean crops can fail, I suppose, or you can make mistakes in your choice of plants, or you're planting in the wrong place or wrong time, or you can neglect to treat something properly, or the weather can play havoc with your plants. Yes, I admit, some of these things you can control, but others may rely on elements you can't control. Failure. really, doesn't come into it.

So, why worry if your crop of onions/potatoes/cauliflowers/beans/peas/leeks/sweet peas/ gladioli/chrysanthemums didn't do what they said they'd do on the packet? No big deal. The time you've spent, the effort you've made, the expense you've gone to in order to make the best of things - so, they didn't work? Tough, that's life. Get on with it.

With such feeble arguments and weaselly words, my mind wanders back to last year's triumphs and disasters. Here, in the middle of winter, in the cutting chill of an icy north wind that insinuates itself through the edges of our door, I try to account for a summer of endless sunshine – and some poor crops.

I must be the world's worst gardener. For reasons unknown to me, no peas grew in my patch. Only a few broad beans, a couple of sweet peas, some sub-standard gladioli, and a few handfuls (hands full?) of belated runner beans. As for onions, my onions were laughably petite.

There we are, then. And now it's now. That's all in the past. Move on. But this year, I'm ahead of the game. In the words of the wise man, I'll meet myself coming back if I'm not careful. Take advantage of a mild spell and be prepared, I said. So, I've cleared out the greenhouse and given it a thorough cleaning and sterilizing, inside and out. (I've wrapped up my small lemon and lime trees there to protect them from frost, and mulched them.)

I've cleaned out the shed – the spiders didn't know what hit them. I've sharpened and oiled all cutting tools, checked the batteries and chargers of the electric tools – and put them back neatly where they belong. While

there, I've checked on the condition of the stored onions and potatoes. Tomatoes and apples, also stored, look ok.

I've emptied the water butts, cleaned them out and filled them with fresh water – and covered the tops. I've hoed the borders and turned over the soil. I've prepared the vegetable plot, digging it two-spade depths – and have aching muscles to show for it.

I've weeded the paths, and got rid of moss on the surface, to avoid slipping. I've raked up and composted as many leaves as I could, and turned over the compost heap. I've scarified the lawn and aerated it. I've finished off the pruning of the fruit trees. (I've already given them their winter wash.)

I've tied up new raspberry canes to stop them loosening in the wind. I've mulched all round, particularly the rhubarb, gooseberry and blackcurrant bushes, as well as the fruit trees.

I've bought in stocks of seed compost, multipurpose compost, blood and bone, Groworganic fertilizer, and canes from **The Trading Hut**. And more 'activator' for the compost.

I've read my garden catalogues thoroughly, and I've settled on what I want for this year. Great! Very exciting! Looking forward to warmer days and enjoying every minute of time spent growing whatever pleases me.

Outside, in the border I can see snowdrops just beginning to appear. Spring, thank heaven, can't be far away. I must remember to split the snowdrop clumps and plant them up.

So many jobs.

No, it won't do, I can't get away with it. I must level with you.

Did I actually say I'd *done* all those things in the garden I mentioned earlier this winter - tidying, cleaning, sharpening, clearing, scarifying, checking, hoeing etc?

What I meant to say, actually, in truth, to make things absolutely clear, was that those vital jobs I've listed above, those essential, necessary jobs, I will definitely do, intend to do, plan to do, have scheduled to do as a top priority.

Rest assured, make no mistake, absolutely, I say this with complete confidence, these tasks will be thoroughly explored and expedited when the time is right, when this icy wind ceases to blow, when I feel in the mood, when the weather warms up, when I can stir my old bones... or when the moon turns blue, in the fulness of time..

I wonder if I'm too old to go into politics.



How to have a more sustainable Christmas

As we approach the festive season, it's the perfect time to re-think our Christmas routines and embrace choices that benefit both people and planet. According to WWF UK, simple yet powerful changes can make a real difference.

Gifts with purpose

Rather than aiming for volume, choose **quality over quantity**. Many of us receive unwanted gifts—so selecting fewer, well-made items promotes longevity and avoids waste. Consider gifting **experiences** instead of tangible goods; outings, vouchers or your time are meaningful and far less resource-intensive. When physical gifts are chosen, check materials—opt for items made from recycled or FSC-certified wood and paper, skip single-use plastics and glittery finishes,

and consider pre-owned or refurbished options. Wrap gifts in recycled paper, avoid plastic ribbons and tape, and reuse bags, ribbons or gift tags year after year.

Seasonal food, minimal waste

Food production drives much of the world's deforestation and emissions, yet waste remains high. Plan realistically for meals, use up leftovers, and store them wisely to avoid throw-away. Shift part of your festive menu towards plant-based options—livestock farming accounts for a large share of man-made greenhouse-gas emissions. When shopping, look for certifications for responsible options: RSPO for palm oil, MSC/ASC for seafood, Fairtrade or Organic for chocolate,

Choose locally coffee and tea. produced and seasonal vegetables—root crops, winter greens, UK apples and pearsrather than items flown in from far away.

Decorate thoughtfully

carry environmental cost too. Pick crackers made from sustainably-sourced paper and avoid toys or items that quickly end up in landfill. Use LED lights, switch them off overnight, favour plug-in rather than batterypowered options, and recycle or repurpose old decorations. If you are purchasing a Christmas tree, ensure it's FSC-certified or consider renting a potted tree for re-use. If choosing a plastic tree, plan for at least ten years of use to lessen its footprint.

Get outside & reconnect

The festive season is also a chance to reconnect with nature and each other. A winter walk in your local park, nature reserve or countryside offers fresh air, perspective and well-being value. and for those Christmas get-togethers inside borrow, share or repair clothing instead of buying new for one-off events—reuse is deeply sustainable.
